

Sporting Events to Mark Israel's 30th Birthday

Harold Landesberg, a trustee of the Federation of Jewish Agencies of Greater Philadelphia, has been appointed director of the largest sporting competition ever to be held in Philadelphia for Jewish boys and girls.

THE COMPETITION, The Delaware Valley Star of David Games, will be held in conjunction with Philadelphia's year-round celebration of the 30th anniversary of Israel, according to Mrs. Charles Conston, chairman of the 30th anniversary coordinating committee for the Federation of Jewish Agencies, and Marshall A. Bernstein, associate chairman.

Some 5,000 area youth are expected to participate in the games, open to Jewish boys and girls between ages of eight and 18.

Landesberg said that he has named Dr. Morton (Moe) Tener, associate professor of education at Glassboro State College, as general chairman of the games.

According to Landesberg, preliminary competition in 27 differ-

founder and director of the Philadelphia International Indoor Tennis Championships.

He was the non-playing captain of the 1969 United States tennis team in the Maccabiah Games in Tel Aviv, and was the gold-medal-winning captain of the 1977 senior tennis team in the Maccabiah Games. Landesberg also was associate chairman of the 1976 Federation Cup tennis matches, is a vice president of the United States Committee, Sports for Israel, and is a founder and charter member of the Sports Lodge of

B'nai B'rith.

Dr. Tener was an all-public basketball player in Philadelphia and has coached basketball teams at Gloucester City High School and Clayton High School in New Jersey. For the past 20 years, he has directed basketball programs and clinics at Camp Log-N-Twig in the Pocono Mountains. Among the participants in his clinics have been Dick Harter, formerly head basketball coach at Penn and now at Oregon University, and Digger Phelps, head basketball coach of the University of Notre Dame.

HE IS the author of 45 professional articles dealing with coaching and various phases of education and camping.

Landesberg also named Sam Browne, Bernard Freedman, Dr. Allen Montros, David Werther, Leonard Senker, Marvin Gross and Myer Bernstein to the steering committee for the games.
